This form was prepared as part of a research/survey/nomination project in 2011-2012 funded by a HRDP grant from the State Historical Society of Iowa for the nomination of the Washington Downtown Historic District. The project was primarily structured to develop the nomination for the downtown, with additional research on each building documented on an Iowa Site Inventory form. The information below is taken from the table in the August 2012 draft of the nomination, with additional information documented on the property and photographs in the following sections.

7. Narrative Description

This is a three story Italianate brick building located on the northeast corner of the intersection of N. Marion and 3rd Street. All sides of the building are visible, as it was built as a hotel and stood as the north edge of downtown commercial development for decades. The original facade faces west. There are brick pilasters at each corner of the building, and another brick pilaster in the middle of the facade. There is a decorative brick cornice across the top of the facade, which is also seen on all other elevations. The original second and third story window openings with stone sills and decorative brick hoods with shoulders and keystones continue to define the character of the building, despite the window replacements and portion infill. The north half of each upper story has two windows, and the south half has a set of narrow paired windows and a single window. The first story has a one-story front entry vestibule addition clad in aluminum siding. Sanborn maps show a one-story porch across the facade through 1931, and this enclosed section appears in a 1936 photograph and on the 1943 Sanborn map. The entry is located under a small roof on the south side of this addition, and a transom

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window extends across the entry and adjacent double-hung window. There are two double-hung windows on the west side, and no openings on the north side of the addition.

The south elevation faces 3rd Street and is visible as one travels north on N. Marion from downtown. It has regularly spaced windows on all three stories. The first story has four windows and a side entry, while the second and third stories have five windows. The openings retain their original stone sills and decorative brick window hoods with shoulders and keystones. The window are infilled with plywood at the top with a smaller double-hung window at the bottom. Likewise, the entry has the same hood detail as the windows, and the transom area has been filled with plywood above a modern door. As noted previously, the decorative cornice continues across the parapet on the south side.

The north elevation has a similar five-bay design as the south elevation, with an exterior brick chimney and side two-story brick section. The brick chimney extends between the front second and third bays. The first story of the north side of the main three-story building, from front (west) to rear, has an original window opening, an added double-hung window, a side entry in original hooded opening, and two original window openings on the east side of the chimney. The second story has two original double-hung window openings on either side of the chimney. The fifth bay on both stories is covered by the side section. The third story has five original window openings. The windows retain their original stone sills and decorative brick window hoods with shoulders (no keystones on this side), though infilled with plywood at the top with a smaller double-hung window at the bottom. The two-story side wing has brick window and entry hoods identical to this side of the main building. The first story of the west side has an entry and double-hung window, and the second story has a double-hung window. These openings are likewise infilled with plywood at the top and replacement windows at the bottom. The north side of the side wing has two windows with the same details as the west side.

The east (rear) elevation has two sections: the main three-story building and the two story side wing. The main building has four original window openings on the second and third stories. They retain stone sills and brick window hoods with shoulders identical to the north side (no keystones). A metal fire escape extends along the building to the south, from the third window of the second story and fourth window on the third story. The first story also has four original window openings, with three double hung windows with plywood infill and hoods and the fourth window covered completely in plywood. The rear of the two-story side wing has two original window openings with the same details as the west and north sides of the wing.

8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Pennsylvania House appears to contribute historically and architecturally to the Washington Downtown Historic District. Though some alterations have been made, the overall form, style, and brick details of the original building are clearly visible. A hotel operated in this building longer than any other hotel in a building in Washington.

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The property was outside the city limits of Washington when it was transferred from James Clyde to Lorenz Benz on Feb. 18, 1876. The *Washington Press* of notes, "L. Bence (sic) has bought for \$1,100 the lot (with buildings) where the planing mills stand, near Hale's mills, and will put up a brick hotel, 40x50." Within a week, Peter and Mary Agnes Tondre transferred additional land to Lorenz Benz which seems to give him title to a parcel of land from the city limits to the rail road tracks. The building is sited farther from the street than neighboring buildings, and is just across the street from the original plat of Washington. At this time, prohibition was a hot topic in Washington. Later history states that Lorenz Benz chose this location on N. Marion across from the town limits so that he was permitted to have a saloon in his hotel. His business proved to be very successful ("Washington had a Tavern near Outset of its Career; Many Hotels Since Then," Centennial Celebration, *Evening Journal*, August 1939, 28; Fisher 1978: 118). The Pennsylvania House operated here for several decades. The 1897 and 1902 Sanborn maps show the three-story Pennsylvania House here. The 1909 Sanborn map and the 1910 city directory then list it as the Benz Hotel.

Agnes Benz, wid. sells the property to George Paul in May of 1912, and Paul sells it to W.S. Eldridge and R.A. Godfrey in Feb of 1913. Eldridge sells his share to Ralph M. Smith on June 4, 1913, and Eldridge sells his share to R. A. Stuart on June 27, 1913. The 1926 city directory continues to list the Stuart Hotel here.

The hotel is listed on the 1931 Sanborn map as Colenso Hotel Annex. The Colenso Hotel was located on the northeast corner of the square (102 W. Main). The Colenso Hotel, and thus annex, was closed by Ray Tracy in 1938.

Evening Journal – Washington County Centennial Celebration – July 1936 - page 85 – The Annex Hotel – started as Pennsylvania House in 1876 – bought by F.W. Welt in March 1928 – Mrs. Welt continue after his death – remodeled and redecorated – assist by son-in-law Harry B. Sowden – manager and daughter – baths, free parking

The old annex was sold to Ezra Nelson in July 1938, and he briefly operated the Nelson Hotel here. It was then sold to Ray Box, who opened the Hotel Grand. It was the Hotel Grand in 1939 ("Washington had a Tavern near Outset of its Career; Many Hotels Since Then," Centennial Celebration, *Evening Journal*, August 1939, 28). The 1956 telephone book lists the Grand Hotel at 306-308 N. Marion, and it remains the Grand Hotel in the 1964 city directory. The hotel then closed with competition from two new hotels in town.

Washington Evening Journal, 60th Anniversary Edition, February 27, 1953, page 13 – "Local Hotels are Asset to City" - hotels in Washington – currently three hotels – Hotel Washington – 104 E. Main – Travelers Hotel – ample parking – Hotel Grand – 28 rooms – three story occupied by long term guests – overnight on first and second story – William Toomey – one block north of post office (306 N. Marion) - all hotels near capacity

Bicentennial Edition, Evening Journal, July 1, 1976 - page 98 – "Hotels, motels have good year" – Chau-Tau Motel – west on old highway 92 – built in 1948 – Hotel Washington – 104 E. Main – organized in 1936 – Rose Motel – ½ mile south of Washington – built in 1959 – swimming pool

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The 1966 city directory lists the Grand Apartments here. It is currently an apartment building.

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
Location map



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Building plan (from assessor's website)


