7. Narrative Description

The church sits on the southwest corner of W. 2nd Street and N. 2nd Ave, with a square tower at the northeast corner of the building. The square tower is angled to the corner, with a double-door entry with arch stained glass transom window at the base. Midway up the steeple is a narrow center section defined by a decorative stone band above and below a set of four narrow rectangular windows. This detail and a similar set of windows is found on both sides of the steeple. The top section of the tower has a pair of pointed arch windows on the three main sides.

The east side of the church faces 2nd Ave. To the south of the corner tower is a gable-roof section with a set of three pointed arch stained glass windows. The center window is taller than the side windows, and decorative stone trim extends across the set of windows. Buttresses are found on either side of the gable section. A side entry within a smaller tower is centered on the south half of the elevation, with two narrow windows on either side. This double-door entry also has an arch transom and arch brick detail, and three narrow rectangular windows are found above the entry.

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The north side of the church faces 2nd Street. It is similar to the east elevation, though not as wide. A gable-roof section identical to the east one is located immediately west of the corner tower. It has buttresses, stone detail, and three stained glass windows. The north side entry is located in a projected entry vestibule with a small gable roof at the west end of this elevation. This double-door entry likewide has an arch transom window and brick arch detail. Small buttress are also found on this section.

The west side of the church has a projected angled section, located behind the altar area on the interior. This section has small rectangular stained glass windows with square transom windows. A chimney centered on this section appears to have been removed. A projected gable-roof section is found on the southwest corner of the building.

The south side of the church connects to a later addition. This gable-roof brick section faces 2nd Ave to the east. It has a main story above a raised basement.

8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Methodist Episcopal Church (Christian Church) appears to contribute historically and architecturally to the Washington Downtown Historic District.

The Methodist Episcopal Church was organized in 1839 about one-and-one-half-miles south of Washington at the home of William L. Harvey. The church was moved into town in 1846 to the corner of Green and Jefferson. In 1856, they then built a new brick church at the southwest corner of 2nd Street (now Avenue B) and Madison (now Second St), and it was dedicated on June 27, 1857 at a cost of \$6,900. Membership was around 200 in 1880. In 1891, the church began to plan construction of a new building on this site, and they hired architects Foster and Liebbe of Des Moines, who had designed the courthouse and were working on the new opera house in town. The church was built by local contractor Frank Edworthy for \$17,000. Total cost of construction was \$20,000. The new Methodist Episcopal Church was dedicated on April 10, 1892 (*History of Washington County, Iowa* 1880: 561; *Washington Press*, May 13, 1891; *Washington Press*, December 23, 1891, 3; Burrell 1909, Vol. 1: 255).

The Washington Press reported:

"In the ceiling of the audience room, in the center, is a dome 15 feet in diameter and 7.5 feet in depth. In the apex is a ventilator, which is concealed by the sprays of electric fixtures, and all round the rim of the dome are incandescent lamps. The pews have birch ends and rail, oak seats and back. The general tint of the interior is a light terra cotta, though a better word is tawny. The colors of walls, ceilings, windows, wood finish, carpets, &c., blend into harmony. The fresco is delightful, The forms are taken from plant life – tendrils; ferns ray out in the corners; in the two square ceiling *panels are* elliptical wreaths, center-starred with thistle floss. The windows are rich, especially the two large ones, the central parts, which are flushed with yellows. There are seventeen memorials. The finishing wood is all hard pine, with hard oil finish, excepting the chancel and choir rails which are oak. H.L. Kendall did the

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painting. Foster and Liebbe were the architects. The church also had an \$1,800 pipe organ." (Foster 1978: 151).

The church is depicted here on Sanborn maps from 1892, 1897, 1902, and 1909. In 1912, they began construction on a new building one block to the east at the northwest corner of Second Street and Marion Avenue, and they moved to this building in 1914 (extant - 206 W. 2nd - #92-00346). The 1917 Sanborn map shows the old church as vacant and still owned by the church body.

The Christian Church purchased this property (lots 1 & 2 of block 6 of the OP) from the Methodist Episcopal Church on June 1, 1921. The Christian Church was formed in 1892, and they met in the rear of the building at 118 E. Washington for several years. They built a small church at 301 E. Jefferson in 1913-14, and they dedicated this building on January 25, 1914. With the new high school built immediately to the east on the majority of this block in 1918, the church decided to move and acquired this larger vacant church from the M.E. Church on June 1, 1921. They completed some interior remodeling and removed the spire on the corner tower (Fisher 1978: 179). Membership of the church in 1976 was 407. The church was remodeled in the 1980s, and a parking lot built to the west.
