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This form was prepared as part of a research/survey/nomination project in 2011-2012 funded by a HRDP grant from the State Historical Society of Iowa for the nomination of the Washington Downtown Historic District. The project was primarily structured to develop the nomination for the downtown, with additional research on each building documented on an Iowa Site Inventory form. The information below is taken from the table in the August 2012 draft of the nomination, with additional information documented on the property and photographs in the following sections.

1946 - Brown's Shoe Fit Company opened store here (lowa chain based in Shenandoah) - here through end of 20th century

#### 7. Narrative Description

This is a two story brick building with facade remodels around 1910, in the 1950s, and in the 1980s. The current storefront dates to the late 1940s or 1950s, after Brown's first moved here in 1946. It has a central entry door deeply recessed between display windows. The door is glass with aluminum. The display windows have one large light facing the street and two facing the walkway from the sidewalk to the door. The display windows overhang the bulkhead, making the shoe display space prominent for potential customers. Teal green panels were utilized for the bulkheads, typical of the 1950s. The center tilework for the exterior entry to the door includes "Brown's" in the tile. On the far left side of the storefront there is a secondary entry to the second story. There is a horizontal/flat aluminum awning over the sidewalk, and aluminum siding from the second story window sills to the awning. The area immediately above the canopy is clad in aluminum siding with "Brown's" in black lettering. The second story has two large windows openings. The c.1910 remodeling added two oriel windows in these

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locations, and the 1940s/50s remodeling replaced the windows with paired three-light horizontal windows. There are currently paired one-over-one-light double-hung windows in each opening. They have brick sills. An area of brick infill extends across the tops of the four windows. This infill is made of a slightly brightly yellow-tan brick. Near the top of the facade is a recess area of brick, and the plain cornice is capped with stone or concrete.

### 8. Narrative Statement of Significance

Williams Boots and Shoes appears to contribute historically to the Washington Downtown Historic District. This shoe store evolved over the decades, with Brown's Shoe Fit Company continuing to operate a shoe store here. The facade and storefront evolved with the shoe stores, with a remodel for Wilson adding oriel windows and a remodel for Brown's removing the windows and remodeling the storefront. These changes are significant within the history of the building.

The *Washington Press*, September 27, 1871, published a lengthy history of Washington, and included a section called Review of Business. Several inches were devoted to J. Albert Williams, "... senior member of the firm of Williams & Upham, he commenced business here in February, 1864, on the west side of the square, in only one side of a store room, and in August of that year moved into the store room one door west of the First National Bank. In 1866 it became necessary for them to build a store, as no adequate accommodations could otherwise be obtained, and with commendable energy, they bought a lot on the east side, on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of August, built a brick store thereon, and moved into it on the 25<sup>th</sup> of October." A newspaper ad in May 1868 lists Williams & Upham on the east side of the square. By May 1871, the ads shift to Williams Boots & Shoes, run by J. Albert Williams, on the east side of the square. He is listed here in ads through the 1880s. A photograph from the 1870s shows the brick building with a large boot sign. Per the September 1871 article, his store was known throughout the area by this large boot sign.

J. Albert Williams & Company continued to operate here through the 1890s, though the personnel had changed. In 1885, son-in-law Frank L. Wilson became a partner of Williams, and he continued the store after Williams died in 1890. In 1904, the name changed to Frank L. Wilson & Co. The building on the east side had grown from 22 by 60 to 22 by 124 by 1913, and new display windows had been installed (*Washington Gazette*, January 6, 1893; *Evening Journal*, April 26, 1913, 21). Postcards and photographs from the early 1900s show this facade remodeled with two bay windows on the second story (and likely the current buff brick) prior to the 1912-13 remodel of the bank on the corner. The bay windows are not noted on the 1909 Sanborn map, but they do appear on the 1917 map. Frank L. Wilson was also active in other community endeavors, including the opera house, telephone company, and Washington Academy.

In spring 1926, Frank L. Wilson sold the shoe store to Corbin & Barrett (*Evening Journal, April 3, 1926, 44, 45*). At this stage, the shoe store boasted a 62 year history in Washington. Earl Corbin and Charlie

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A. Barrett are then listed with Corbin & Barrett Bootery here for a few years. In April 1930, the store then became the Welch-Moore Shoe Co, which then became Moore's Bootery by 1934, run by Fred L. Moore (*Evening Journal* – Washington County Centennial Celebration – July 1936 - page 19). He bought the building from the Hannah Wilson estate in November 1937. Haney's Shoe Repair Shop also operated in Moore's Bootery in the 1930s. James' Shoe Repair was then here in the 1941 directory, with Moore's Bootery. The Moore family continued to own the building until 1968.

In 1946, Brown's Shoe Fit Company (an lowa chain based in Shenandoah) bought the former local store, and they operated here through the 1950s and 1960s. In the early 1950s, they added a thrift department, where one could fit one's own shoes to save money (*Washington Evening Journal*, 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Edition, February 27, 1953, 108). In the late 1940s or 1950s, it appears that the building was remodeled with a new (the current) storefront, with Brown's as the name in the tile on the entry. The oriel windows on the second story were also removed and replaced with horizontal windows, seen in the 1971 photograph. These windows are currently double-hung windows. They continued to operate here in the centennial in 1976, with a photo of the Williams store and current store published (Bicentennial Edition, *Evening Journal*, July 1, 1976, 33). Brown's continues to operate a shoe store here in 2012, approaching 150 years of a shoe store operating at this location.

The second floor was occupied by the following: Dr. H.F. Masson, Dentist and Dr. W.J. Masson, MD – 1926 (telephone directory); Dr. Lyda M. Hellam, Chiropractor – 1932 (telephone directory); Drs. Livesay & Dockum, Chiropractors – 1935 (city directory); Dr. F.G. Livesay, Chiropractor - 1937 to at least 1964 (various directories).

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

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### **Location map**




2009 aerial photograph (Washington County) - line indicates survey/research area boundary



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
