7. Narrative Description

This is a two story brick building with two storefronts that share a central arch recessed entry area. The storefront area on the facade (east) is white glazed brick, and the rest of the building is textured brick. On the first story, there is a wide centered Romanesque arch, and recessed within the arch are three doors. The center door provides access to the second story. The doors on the left and right are set at an angle and are the entrances to the two storefronts. On each side of the arch, there is a large display window composed of two fixed lights with transoms. The transom areas are infilled with a metal panels. On the far right hand side of the facade a recessed door with transom that goes to the basement. The facade also has four infilled opening below the display windows, which provided light to the basement. There is a second story balcony across the full width of the facade. The balcony has a modern wood railing. An oriel window is located above each of the storefronts, with three double-hung windows in each one and an asphalt shingle roof. Two doors which provide access from the apartments to the balcony are located between the oriel windows. The windows have aluminum storm windows, and the doors have modern single light storm doors and wood infill above the doors in the transom area. Above

the second story windows, there is a soldier brick course of glazed white brick, with another band of glazed white brick set in groups of three to form to the square decoration on the cornice. In the area between these bands, the front corners of the building have a decorative brick rectangle, and a wider brick rectangle of white glazed brick is centered on the building. The cornice is capped with a band of stone or concrete.

On the north (alley) facade, which is red textured brick, there are, from left to right, a double-hung window, a small double-hung window, a double-hung window, a side entry, and an vehicular-sized opening infilled with concrete. The second story has two single double-hung windows and a set of paired double-hung windows on the front half, and four single double-hung windows on the back half. The glazed soldier brick band and square cornice detail continue on this side and the south side. The south facade is visible from the sidewalk because there is a four foot space between the buildings. There are basement windows on this side of the building, as well as double-hung windows on the first story. The second story as two single double-hung windows and a set of paired double-hung windows on the first story. 8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Neiswanger Building appears to contribute historically and architecturally to the Washington Downtown Historic District.

The property was purchased by Fredrick Neiswanger in 1899. An earlier, smaller building is shown on the 1902 and 1909 Sanborn maps. The 1910 city directory lists Neiswanger Stone at 215 S. Iowa. In October 1911, Fredrick purchased his partner's share of the property. In March 1915, a notice appeared for the anticipated construction of a \$7,000 Flat & Store for Fred Neiswanger at 215 S Iowa Ave, which would be a brick, two-story building 44x66' - "Contemplated will mature about June" ("Building News of the Week," *Construction News*, Chicago, March 6, 1915, 23). The current building first appears on the 1917 Sanborn map. Lupton Monument Works is listed here from 1926 until at least 1932. By 1935, the name has shifted to Newswanger Monuments. The Neiswanger company continued at this location through at least 1941 (city directory). The *Evening Journal* from July 1936, page 99, notes that Fred Neiswanger has been located in Washington since 1894, and his marble works produce artistic memorials for cemeteries.

Between 1917 and 1931, a small store was subdivided in the northeast corner, noted on the 1931 Sanborn map with an address of 215A. The Exide Battery Station lists 215 S. Iowa Avenue as it's location in 1926, and from 1932 to 1935, it is Franzen Battery Station. No listing was identified here in 1941.

On June 10, 1946, the property transferred from the estate of Fred Neiswanger to Minnie Neiswanger. On August 30, 1947, it then was sold to H.F. and Willa Freshwaters. The Iowa Memorial Company

was listed here in 1952, with the Soil Conservation Office in the small space. In 1956, the Soil Conservation Service office and the office of Dr. G.J. Nemmers are listed at 215. The Soil Conservation Service then moved around the corner to 108 W. Jefferson in 1963. In 1964, Brown Finance and Insurance is listed at 215, while Dr. G.J. Nemmers is now listed at 217. Freshwaters owned the building until 1984.

The current occupant is H & R Block Tax Preparation.



Location map




2009 aerial photograph (Washington County) – line indicates survey/research area boundary
