Narrative Description

This is a two story, two bay, frame Queen Anne house built about 1898 on the north side of W Jefferson Street. The house sits on a stone foundation, and it is clad in vinyl siding. The cross gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A full porch spans the façade. The porch has a wood floor and railings, vinyl clad square posts, and wood steps. The windows were replaced in 2005 and are vinyl clad with vinyl surrounds. All windows have aluminum storm / screens. There are wood fishscale shingles on the gables. A two car, steel clad, garage is located at the northeast corner of the lot with access from the alley, built in 1985 per the assessor.

The façade, the south elevation, is divided into two sections, with the right/east gable-front section being slightly projected. On the first story, the west third has a decorative steel entry door with an aluminum storm / screen door. The east two-thirds has a large one-over-one-light double-hung wood window. On the second story, the west third has a one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window above the entry. The east gable-roof section has a centrally located one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window above the first floor window. On the gable, there are wood fishscale shingles and a small centered one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window.

The west elevation is divided into three sections by a center gable-roof section. On the first story, the right/south/front section has a one-over-one-light double-hung window on each story The middle section, which projects a few feet, has a large one-over-one-light double-hung window on each story, wider than typical for the house. The third/rear/north section has a one-over-one-light double-hung window to the far right of the section, and another smaller one-over-one-light double-hung window with a higher than typical sill on the left/north of the section. The second story has a smaller one-over-one-light double-hung vindow on the left side.

The east elevation is divided into three sections by a center two-story bay window with a gable roof. The left/south/front section has a one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window on both stories. The center bay window has a large one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window in the center on the first story, and three second story one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl windows, one in the center and one on each angled wall of the bay window. There are wood fishscale shingles on the gable, and there is a one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window in the center of the gable. The rear/north section of the house has a one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window on each story.

The north/rear elevation has a one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl window on the far right/west on the rear section of the house. The remainder of the north elevation consists of a one story enclosed porch with a shed roof covered with asphalt shingles. The porch is clad with vinyl siding. The west end of the porch has a two-light sliding window. The north side of the porch has an aluminum storm / screen door at the right (west) end of the wall, and to the left there is a set of four one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl windows. On the east end of the porch, there are two two-light casement windows. On the second story of the house, there are two widely spaced one-over-one-light double-hung vinyl windows, one at each side of the house

The two car garage near the northeast corner of the lot adjacent to the alley sits on a poured concrete slab, and it is clad with corrugated steel panels. The gable-front roof is also steel. There are two steel one-car garage doors facing west, and between them is a steel entry door. There are wood surrounds on the garage doors and entry. There are no windows on any side of this garage.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Alexander and Mary Gibson House appears to contribute historically to the potential "west side" residential historic district in Washington. The house was built in 1898 during the period of development of the neighborhood with large homes for successful men. Several Queen Anne houses were built in this period, with this one typical of a standard home of this style. It is significant within this period of development of the neighborhood.

The house does not appear individually eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A, B, or C. The house does not appear to have particular architectural or historical significance.

History / research summary of property (chronological order, by owner/period):

The 1897 Sanborn map indicates lot 7 is vacant. Alexander Gibson purchased the property on January 31, 1898. The 1900 census lists Alexander Gibson (76), his wife Mary (64), and his sister Sarah J. Gibson (71). A boarder, Sadie E. Hastings (25), also lives with them. The 1903 city directory lists the family at 308 W Jefferson as Alex Gibson, a retired farmer, his wife Mary, and Sarah Gibson. When Alexander Gibson died on January 1, 1905, the property was transferred to his heirs, who later transferred their shares to his son William Gibson on July 15, 1912. The 1910 census lists Mary Gibson (74, widow) living here with lodgers John and Mary Stewart. John H. and Mary J. Stewart, a retired farmer, are living at 308 W Jefferson in the 1910-11 city directory.

William A. Gibson sold the property to Mary Brooks, unmarried, in October 1918, who sold it in December 1918 to Henderson Wallace and his sister Annie Wallace. The 1920 census lists the residents as Henderson Wallace, age 63 and single, Anna Wallace, age 61, his sister, Mrs. Jennie Brashier, age 65, also a sister, and Minnie Stein, age 28, a niece and single. Wallace also appears in the 1926 and 1932 telephone directories at this address, and in the 1935 city directory. The 1930 census lists Henderson Wallace, age 73, single, living here with sisters Anna Wallace, 65, single, and Jennie Brashear, 70, single. The house is valued at \$4,000.

On January 9, 1936, Wallace transferred the property to Minnie Stein Beach (the niece). She used it as a rental property. The 1940 census lists Homer Jugenheimer (23, salesman for auto parts), renting this house and living here with wife Mildred (23). They rented it for \$24 per month. The 1941 city directory lists the house as vacant.

Minnie Stein Beach and husband transferred the property to Bessie Palmer on March 2, 1945. She sold it to H.M. Smith on July 3, 1947, and he sold it to Coralie T. Briley on January 11, 1952. The 1954 telephone directory names Mrs. Willa A. Young living at this address, and she appears again as Billie Young in 1956 and 1958 directories. The 1964 city directory lists Mabel E. Merriman, widow of Van A. and Alice Merriman, a bookkeeper at Washington State Bank as residents at 308 W Jefferson, and John W. Richards, a cutter at McCleery-Cumming Company, and his wife Sue S. Richards, living at 308 ¹/₂ W Jefferson. By 1967, only Alice Merriman is listed there.

On November 22, 1968, Coralie T. Briley, single et al. sold the property to Cecil H. and Colleen Bruns. In the 1969 city directory, Glen A. Bruns, assistant manager at Mid-American Manufacturing, his wife Charlotte, E. and children Randy, Leroy, Teresa, Brian, and Bruce are living here. The 1972 and 1976 city directories identify Forest A. Cline, a custodian at the University of Iowa and his wife Velma living in the house. Cecil H. and Colleen Bruns transferred the property to Ronald L. and Linda Bruns on October 5, 1976.
