Narrative Description

This is a one-story side gable frame minimal traditional house built around 1947 on the west side of S. Avenue B. The house sits on a rusticated concrete block foundation, and it is clad with aluminum siding. The roof is covered with corrugated steel. There is a concrete porch at the front entry. The windows are wood with aluminum storm / screens. At the rear of the property there is a two car frame garage with access from the alley.

The façade, the east elevation, has a set of concrete steps leading up to a concrete porch which has metal railings. The wood entry door has a window in the upper part of the door, and an aluminum storm / screen door. To the left of the front entry, at the left/south corner of the house, there is a large fixed wood picture window with a wood awning above it. To the right of the entry, there is a six-over-six-light double-hung wood window with an aluminum storm / screen. There is a basement window located below the picture window.

The north elevation, facing the alley has two six-over-one-light double-hung wood windows evenly distributed on the wall. Above and between them, below the peak of the gable, there is a six light sash above an attic exhaust fan vent.

The south elevation has a large fixed wood picture window at the east/right edge. A window with a wood screen is roughly centered on this side. To the left, there is a pair of windows with wood screens. At the attic level, there is a window below the peak of the gable which has ventilation slats in the lower sash. All the windows on this elevation have wood slat awnings above them, including the attic window. There are three basement windows, one below each of the first story windows. A small shed-roof addition extends to the west, with the south side slightly recessed from the main section of the house. The south side has a side entry with low shed roof overhanging the door, supported by a wood brace, and a small, low concrete step up to the door. The door has a window in the upper half of the door, and an aluminum storm / screen door.

The west elevation, the rear of the house, has a two six-over-one light double-hung wood windows, one at the left/north end and one centered. There is a basement window below the center window. To the right, immediately beside the rear addition, there is a small six-over-six light double-hung wood window with a wood screen. The small shed-roof addition is found at the south/right end of the elevation. The west wall of the addition has a six-over-six-light double-hung wood window with a wood screen. The south wall of the addition has the previously described rear entry door. The north facing elevation of the addition has no fenestration.

The two-car gable-oriented frame garage sits on a poured concrete foundation, is clad with vinyl siding, and has a corrugated metal roof. The aluminum double-car garage door faces north, toward the alley. There is a wood entry door toward the right side of the south elevation. There are no windows in the garage. It appears that the garage was built after the end of the period of significance for the potential historic district, so it is tabulated as non-contributing.

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Narrative Statement of Significance

The Ira W. and Helen Shenefelt House appears to contribute historically and architecturally to the potential "west side" residential historic district in Washington. The house was built around 1947 during the post-war period of development of the neighborhood. It is one of a few minimal traditional houses in the neighborhood, and it retains several original features including large corner picture windows and six-over-one-light double-hung wood windows.

The house does not appear to be individually eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A, B, or C. The house does not appear to have particular architectural or historical significance.

History / research summary of property

Howard Crozier owned all Lot 8, having purchased it on May 2, 1940. He was living in the house at 302 W. Main Street on the south half of the lot. On August 15, 1946, he sold his back yard, the north 50 feet of Lot 8, to J.M. White. Jim White was manager of the Washington Lumber and Fuel Company, and he then built a house on this portion of the lot. The assessor lists a construction date of 1947 for this house. A note in the *Evening Journal* on August 8, 1948 notes that scarcity of building materials in this period delayed the completion of the house ("Ramblings and Remnants, " *Evening Journal*, April 8, 1948, 4). He then sold it to Everett L. Hammen on December 12, 1947. Hammen quickly resold the property for \$10,500 to Helen Shenefelt on January 3, 1948. They previously lived at 403 W. Washington from 1931-1942 and then owned the house at 509 W. Jefferson from 1942 to January 2, 1948, when they then moved to this new house. Ira W. Shenefelt, or Tink, sold automobiles for several years in Washington, retiring around this time. The 1952 telephone directory lists I.W. Shenefelt living at 111 N. Avenue B. The listing continues unchanged until the 1969 city directory listing which identified the resident at this address as Helen E. Shenefelt (widow Ira), a nurse's aide at the Washington City Hospital. She sold the property for \$37,500 to the current owner Kenneth H. Wagner, on December 10, 1986.


